Brief summary of the walk: Cogswell's Grant is a coastal farm of 165 acres located along the banks of the Essex River, just two miles inland from the Atlantic Ocean. As one of the largest land masses remaining in the Town of Essex that originated as a seventeenth-century land grant, and with extant landscape features on the property dating from each of its ownership periods, it is an extremely significant historic agricultural landscape. As one of the few protected stretches of open land along the Essex River, it provides an important and diverse habitat for local and migrating wildlife, as well as public access to pristine marshland, rolling hayfields, and beautiful views of the river stretching to the sea. The original grant of land to John Cogswell in 1636 was for 300 acres, and though that property was partly divided and sold or given to various heirs, the current parcel of 165 acres has been intact since it was passed to Jonathan Cogswell Jr. in 1717.
